Article III, Section 3:

The Legislative Assembly shall exercise fiduciary responsibility over the affairs of NCA and is responsible for the overall strategic direction and policymaking of the Association. Journal Editors of the Association shall each be approved by the Legislative Assembly for a term of three years. The Publications Council will provide a slate to the Executive Committee for endorsement, which is then forwarded to the Legislative Assembly for approval.

ARTICLE I: NAME AND PURPOSE

Section 1: Name.

The name of this corporation shall be "National Communication Association" (hereinafter, "NCA" or "the Association").

Section 2: Purpose.

- A. The National Communication Association advances communication as the discipline that studies all forms, modes, media and consequences of communication through humanistic, social scientific and aesthetic inquiry. NCA serves the scholars, teachers, and practitioners who are its members by enabling and supporting their interests in research, teaching, and practice. Dedicated to fostering and promoting free, inclusive, and ethical communication, NCA promotes the widespread appreciation of the importance of communication in public and private life, the application of competent communication to improve the quality and diversity of human life and relationships, and the use of knowledge about communication to solve human problems.
- B. NCA has the goal of fostering and promoting a diverse and inclusive organization.
- C. NCA is organized exclusively for charitable, educational and scientific purposes within the meaning of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 501(c)(3), as amended (or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws).
- D. No part of the net earnings of NCA shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, Directors, Officers, employees, or other private persons, except that NCA shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of IRC Section 501(c)(3) purposes.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERSHIP

Section 1: Membership Categories.

NCA shall have the following individual membership categories: Retired, Student, Life, and Regular. In addition, NCA shall have the following group membership category: Department/Program.

- A. Retired membership is open to any person interested in the Association's purpose who has been a member of the Association for at least twenty-five years and is no longer working full-time.
- B. Student membership is open to any person interested in the Association's purpose who is currently enrolled for higher education credit and does not have a terminal degree.
- C. Life membership is open to any person interested in the Association's purpose who does not fit into the categories of Retired or Student membership.
- D. Regular membership is open to any person interested in the Association's purpose who does not fit into the categories of Retired or Student membership.
- E. Department/Program membership is open to any department or program at an institution of higher education with an interest in the Association's purpose.

Section 2: Admission to Membership.

Any individual or group that meets the qualifications of a membership category specified in Section 1 may be admitted to membership in accordance with policies and procedures established by the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly.

Section 3: Rights and Responsibilities.

- A. An individual member shall have the right to vote and hold elected or appointed office as specifically provided in these Bylaws. All individuals serving in leadership positions including, but not limited to, Officers, Directors, or members of any committee shall be required to hold membership in the Association.
- B. In order to maintain membership status, an individual or group member shall pay annual dues by the member's renewal date. Dues for each membership category shall
- C. be established by the Legislative Assembly.
- D. Privileges and responsibilities of each membership category shall be established by the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly.

ARTICLE III: LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Section 1: Members.

The Legislative Assembly shall consist of the following representatives, which representatives are sometimes referred to in these Bylaws as "Directors":

- A. President.
- B. First Vice President.
- C. Second Vice President.
- D. Immediate Past President.
- E. Executive Director (non-voting).
- F. Members of the Finance Committee.
- G. Mentorship and Leadership Council Chair
- H. Publications Council Chair.
- I. Research Council Chair.
- J. Teaching and Learning Council Chair.
- K. IDEA Council Chair.
- L. A number of representatives from each Interest Group, determined in accordance with Section 2(G) below.
- M. Nine At-Large Directors.
- N. Six Directors appointed by the Legislative Assembly according to appointment procedures adopted by the Legislative Assembly; selection to recognize emerging interests and critical problems and to achieve a balanced representation of teaching levels, ethnic and minority group interests, sex, age, and academic status.
- O. Three Directors from each of the four regional communication associations (Central States Communication Association, Eastern Communication Association, Southern States Communication Association).
- P. National States Advisory Council representative.
- Q. Association of Communication Administration Executive Committee representative.

Section 2: Election and Terms.

- A. The President shall, after a one-year term, succeed to the office of Immediate Past President. The Immediate Past President shall serve for a term of one year. The First Vice President shall, after a one-year term, succeed to the office of President.
- B. The Second Vice President shall, after a one-year term, succeed to the office of First Vice President.
- C. The Second Vice President shall be elected by plurality vote of individual members and shall become the Second Vice President when the current Second Vice President succeeds to the office of First Vice President A quorum shall consist of 1/20th of the individual membership. The ballot for the Second Vice President election shall be developed by the Nominating Committee.

- D. The Finance Directors shall be elected by the Legislative Assembly for a term of three years. Terms of the Finance Directors are staggered, and one Finance Director shall be elected each year. The Leadership Development Committee will provide a slate to the Legislative Assembly for approval after consultation with the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee Chair shall be the Finance Director serving the third year of the three- year term.
- E. The Chairs of the IDEA Council, Publications Council, Research Council, Mentorship and Leadership Council, and Teaching and Learning Council shall each be elected by the Legislative Assembly for a term of three years. The Leadership Development Committee will provide a slate to the Legislative Assembly for approval.
- F. The representatives from each Interest Group, the number of which representatives shall be determined according to clauses (a) through (e) below depending on the size of the Interest Group, shall be appointed to the Legislative Assembly by that Interest Group for terms of one year.
 - a. Divisions and Sections with fewer than 500 members have 2 representatives.
 - b. Divisions and Sections with 500-999 members have 3 representatives.
 - c. Divisions and Sections with 1,000-1,499 members have 4 representatives.
 - d. Divisions and Sections with 1,500 or more members have 5 representatives.
 - e. Each Caucus has one representative.
- G. The At-Large representatives on the Legislative Assembly shall be elected by plurality vote of individual members of the Association for a term of three years. A quorum shall consist of 1/20th of the individual membership. Three (3) of these At- Large representatives shall be elected each year. The ballot for the atlarge representatives on the Legislative Assembly election shall be developed by the Nominating Committee. No member shall be eligible to serve two consecutive full terms as an At-Large representative.
- H. The six individual representatives appointed by the Legislative Assembly shall serve staggered terms of three years, such that two of these representatives shall be appointed each year.
- I. The representatives from the four regional associations, the National States Advisory Council representative, and the Association of Communication Administration Executive Committee representative shall each be appointed to the Legislative Assembly by their respective association or council for terms of three years.

Section 3: Duties.

The Legislative Assembly shall exercise fiduciary responsibility over the affairs of NCA and is responsible for the overall strategic direction and policymaking of the Association. Journal Editors of the Association shall each be approved by the Legislative Assembly for a term of three years. The Publications Council will provide a slate to the Executive Committee for endorsement, which is then forwarded to the Legislative Assembly for approval.

Section 4: Meetings.

- A. The Legislative Assembly shall meet at least annually at or around the national convention.
- B. The agenda shall be determined by the President in consultation with the Executive Director. The Legislative Assembly will approve the agenda at the start of the meeting.
- C. The President shall preside at meetings.
- D. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the members of the Legislative Assembly.
- E. The Legislative Assembly may hold meetings using telephone or electronic means that allow participants to actively deliberate with each other. The Legislative Assembly may also take action by written consent of the majority of the Legislative Assembly, including using email.
- F. Legislative Assembly meetings shall be open to all NCA members.

Section 5: Vacancies.

- A. A vacancy in the office of President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, or Second Vice President Elect shall be filled for the balance of the term in which the vacancy occurred by appointment of the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly. The person so appointed to fill such vacancy, after the conclusion of that term, shall not automatically succeed to subsequent office as set forth in Section 2(A), (B) and (C), respectively. Rather, such subsequent office shall be filled by member vote, following the same procedures as set forth in Section 2(D) for the Second Vice President election.
- B. A vacancy in the office of Immediate Past President may be filled by appointment of the Officers from the pool of past Presidents of the Association.
- C. Vacancies among the nine at-large and six appointed representative positions (described above in Section 1(A)(n) and (o), respectively) may be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly. Members selected to fill these vacant positions shall complete the balance of the calendar year in which the position became vacant. The position will then be filled for the remainder of the term, if any, following the process described in Section 2 above usually used to fill the position.
- D. Vacancies among the representatives of Interest Groups, the four regional associations, the National States Advisory Council and the Association of Communication Administration Executive Committee may be filled in the same manner as the original representative was appointed.

Section 6: Committees

- A. Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly. The Executive Committee shall consist of the following members: President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Immediate Past President, three Finance Committee Members, Mentorship and Leadership Council Chair, Publications Council Chair, Research Council Chair, Teaching and Learning Council Chair, IDEA Council Chair, and Executive Director (non-voting). The Executive Committee shall administer the policies of the Legislative Assembly and shall, between annual meetings of the Assembly, serve as the chief administrative authority of the Association. The Executive Committee shall have authority to set association fees other than membership dues and to establish standing rules and procedures to govern the conduct of elections. The Executive Committee shall meet regularly. The agenda of meetings shall be determined by the President in consultation with the Executive Director. The Executive Committee may hold meetings using telephone or electronic means that allow participants to actively deliberate with each other. The Executive Committee may also take action by written consent of 2/3 of the Executive Committee, including using email.
- B. **Finance Committee**. The Finance Committee shall consist of the Finance Committee Chair and the two other Finance Directors. The Finance Committee is responsible for providing guidance and information to the Legislative Assembly on the financial affairs of the Association and shall have such other responsibilities as are established from time to time by the Legislative Assembly or Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly. The Finance Committee shall meet regularly. The agenda of meetings shall be determined by the Finance Committee Chair in consultation with the Executive Director. The Finance Committee may hold meetings using telephone or electronic means that allow participants to actively deliberate with each other. The Finance Committee may also take action by written consent of 2/3 of the Finance Committee, including using email.

ARTICLE IV: OFFICERS

Section 1: Officers.

The Officers of the Association shall be the President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Immediate Past President, Treasurer, and Secretary. The President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, and Immediate Past President shall be elected and assume such offices in the manner set forth in Article 3. The office of Treasurer shall be held by the Finance Committee Chair and the office of Secretary shall be held without vote by the Executive Director.

Section 2: Duties.

- A. **President**. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Legislative Assembly and the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly and shall perform all duties incident to the office of President and such other duties as may be prescribed by the Legislative Assembly.
- B. **First Vice President**. The First Vice President shall perform the duties of the President during such time as the President is unable or unwilling to perform the same, shall be in charge of the planning of the program for the annual convention, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the President or by the Legislative Assembly.
- C. **Second Vice President**. The Second Vice President shall perform the duties of the First Vice President during such time as the First Vice President is unable or unwilling to perform the same and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the President or by the Legislative Assembly.
- D. **Immediate Past President**. The Immediate Past President shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or by the Legislative Assembly.
- E. **Treasurer**. The Treasurer shall perform all duties incident to the office of Treasurer and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the President or Legislative Assembly.
- F. **Secretary.** The Secretary shall perform all duties incident to the office of Secretary and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the President or Legislative Assembly.

ARTICLE V: STANDING COMMITTEES

Section 1: Leadership Development Committee.

- A. Members. The Leadership Development Committee shall consist of the following members: Immediate Past President, President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, four At-Large representatives appointed by the Legislative Assembly from among the current members of the Legislative Assembly, four At-Large members elected by vote of the individual membership of NCA, and Executive Director (non- voting). The At-Large representatives appointed by the Legislative Assembly and the At-Large representatives elected by the individual NCA membership shall serve staggered two-year terms, with two representatives appointed by the Legislative Assembly and two representatives elected by the individual membership of NCA each year. The Immediate Past President shall serve as Chair of the Committee.
- B. Duties. The Leadership Development Committee shall develop a slate of candidates for the following positions, such slate subject to election by the Legislative Assembly: Finance Committee member; Chairs and members of the Mentorship and Leadership Council, Publications Council, Research Council, Teaching and Learning Council, Resolutions Committee, and Convention Committee; Chair of the IDEA Council; Nominating Committee at-large member and Nominating Committee Chair; and members of award selection committees unless otherwise specifically provided in applicable award agreements. In addition, the Leadership Development Committee shall develop a slate of candidates for four Nominating Committee at-large members, such candidates subject to election by the NCA membership.

Section 2: Nominating Committee.

- A. Members. The Nominating Committee shall consist of the following members, each of whom shall serve one-year terms:
 - a. The Chair of the Nominating Committee, who shall be elected by the Legislative Assembly from the candidates selected by the Leadership Development Committee, as set forth in Section 1(B) above.
 - b. One representative chosen by each Interest Group.
 - c. The IDEA Council Chair.

- d. One representative from each of the four regional associations represented on the Legislative Assembly, chosen by each regional association.
- e. Four at-large members elected by the full voting NCA membership from the slate of candidates developed by the Leadership Development Committee, as set forth in Section 1(B) above.
- f. One at-large member elected by the Legislative Assembly from the candidates selected by the Leadership Development Committee, as set forth in Section 1(B) above.
- B. Duties. Each year, the Nominating Committee shall prepare a ballot for the election of the Second Vice President, three at-large members of the Legislative Assembly, and two at-large members of the Leadership Development Committee to be elected by the full voting NCA membership.

Section 3: Mentorship and Leadership Council

- A. Members. The Mentorship and Leadership Council shall consist of a Chair and six members elected by the Legislative Assembly from a slate of candidates developed by the Leadership Development Committee. The Leadership Development Committee will consult with the Mentorship and Leadership Council during the selection process. The Mentorship and Leadership Chair and Council members shall serve for a term of three years. Terms of the members of the Mentorship and Leadership Council shall be staggered, such that terms of two members shall expire each year.
- B. Duties. The Mentorship and Leadership Council shall coordinate, centralize, and organize mentorship and leadership resources, activities, and opportunities for NCA.

Section 4: Publications Council.

- A. Members. The Publications Council shall consist of a Chair and six members elect Leadership Development Committee Leadership Development Committee ed by the Legislative Assembly from a slate of candidates developed by the Leadership Development Committee. The Leadership Development Committee will consult with the Publications Council during the selection process. The Publications Council Chair and Council members shall serve for a term of three years. Terms of the members of the Publications Council shall be staggered, such that terms of two members shall expire each year.
- B. Duties. The Publications Council shall be responsible for supporting the Association's publishing program, including recommending editors to the Legislative Assembly for the Association's Journals and filling Journal editor vacancies as necessary.

Section 5: Research Council.

- A. Members. The Research Council shall consist of a Chair and six members elected by the Legislative Assembly from a slate of candidates developed by the Leadership Development Committee. The Leadership Development Committee Development Commi
- B. Duties. The Research Council shall be responsible for supporting the creation and dissemination of knowledge about communication.

Section 6: Teaching and Learning Council.

- A. Members. The Teaching and Learning Council shall consist of a Chair and six members elected by the Legislative Assembly from a slate of candidates developed by the Leadership Development Committee. The Leadership Development Committee will consult with the Teaching and Learning Council during the selection process. The Teaching and Learning Council Chair and Council members shall serve for a term of three years. Terms of the members of the Teaching and Learning Council shall be staggered, such that terms of two members shall expire each year.
- B. Duties. The Teaching and Learning Council shall be responsible for supporting disciplinary pedagogy.

Section 7: IDEA Council.

- A. Members. The IDEA Council shall consist of a Chair and one representative from each of the Association's Caucuses. The Chair of the IDEA Council shall be elected by the Legislative Assembly from a slate provided by the Leadership Development Committee for a term of three years. The Le a dership Development Committee will consult with the IDEA Council during the selection process. Each of the Association's caucuses shall elect one of its members to serve on the IDEA Council for a term of three years. Terms of the IDEA Council members shall be staggered.
- B. Duties. The IDEA Council is responsible for monitoring and making recommendations to enhance the diversity of the Association.

Section 8: Resolutions Committee.

- A. Members. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of a Chair and five members elected by the Legislative Assembly from a slate of candidates developed by the Leadership Development Committee. The Chair shall be selected from among the first- and second-year members of the Resolutions Committee to serve a term of one year. Resolutions Committee members shall have staggered three-year terms.
- B. Duties. The Resolutions Committee shall be responsible for reviewing proposed public statements and providing related recommendations to the Legislative Assembly.

Section 9: Convention Committee.

- A. Members. The Convention Committee shall consist of a Chair and five members elected by the Legislative Assembly from a slate of candidates developed by the Leadership Development Committee. The Chair shall be selected from among the first- and second-year members of the Convention Committee to serve a term of one year. Convention Committee members shall have staggered three-year terms.
- B. Duties. The Convention Committee shall be responsible for providing recommendations on issues related to convention locations.

Section 10: Meetings.

- A. Meetings of any Standing Committee may be called by the chair of the committee or by any two members of the committee. The date, location, and agenda of the meetings shall be determined by the committee chair.
- B. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the standing committee members.
- C. Standing committees may hold meetings using telephone or electronic means that allow participants to actively deliberate with each other. Committees can also take action by written consent of 2/3 of the Committee, including using email.

Section 11: Vacancies.

A. Standing committee vacancies may be filled by the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly. Members selected to fill vacant positions shall complete the balance of the term which became vacant.

ARTICLE VI: EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Authority for the day-to-day management of the Association shall be vested in an Executive Director whose employment and termination shall be the responsibility of the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly. The Executive Director shall have such authority and duties as are determined by the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly. The Executive Director shall be responsible for hiring and termination of staff and paid contractors.

ARTICLE VII: INTEREST GROUPS

Section 1: Divisions.

Interest groups for members with shared focus on particular topics of substantive study shall be known as Divisions.

Section 2: Sections.

Interest groups for members sharing common professional settings shall be known as Sections.

Section 3: Caucuses.

Consistent with the Association's commitment to equal opportunity, interest groups representing historically underrepresented demographic groups in terms of gender, race, ethnicity, sexuality, and ability shall be known as Caucuses.

Section 4: Creation.

Divisions and Sections may be created by the Legislative Assembly upon receipt of petitions signed by at least 200 members of the Association. Caucuses may be created by the Legislative Assembly in response to petitions signed by at least 50 members of the Association.

Section 5: Dissolution.

Any Division or Section failing for two consecutive years to maintain at least 100 members shall be dissolved. The Legislative Assembly shall have authority to dissolve Caucuses.

Section 6: Convention.

Each Interest Group will have a role in planning the program for the annual convention.

ARTICLE VIII: PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern NCA in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws and any special rules of order NCA may adopt.

ARTICLE IX: MISCELLANEOUS

Section 1: Conflict of Interest.

The Association shall maintain a conflict-of-interest policy and annual disclosure process that shall apply to all Chairs and Officers and any other individuals specified by the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly.

Section 2: Indemnification.

NCA will indemnify employees, Officers, Directors, and volunteers as determined by the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly and based on facts and circumstances.

Section 3: Dissolution.

Upon the dissolution of NCA, all its assets and property of every nature and description remaining after the payment of all liabilities and obligations of NCA shall be distributed for one or more exempt purposes within the meaning of section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended (or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws), consistent with the purposes of NCA, as determined by the Legislative Assembly.

ARTICLE X: AMENDMENTS

Section 1: Proposed Amendments.

Proposed amendments to these Bylaws shall be submitted for a vote of the Legislative Assembly upon:

- A. A petition signed by at least twenty percent (20%) of individual members submitted to the President at least 90 days prior to a meeting of the Legislative Assembly, or
- B. A petition signed by at least twenty percent (20%) of the members of the Legislative Assembly submitted to the President at least 90 days prior to a meeting of the Legislative Assembly, or
- C. A majority vote of the Executive Committee of the Legislative Assembly.

Section 2: Adoption.

A two-thirds vote of the Legislative Assembly shall be required for adoption of an amendment to these Bylaws.

Orientation Materials

Legislative Assembly Meeting

The Legislative Assembly (LA) meets at least once a year at NCA's Annual Convention. There is typically a four-hour afternoon session the day before the convention begins, and a two-hour morning session on the third day of the convention. New for this year, the LA will be meeting virtually in April.

Business at the LA meeting is governed by NCA's Bylaws, and its decisions are guided by NCA's strategic plan. Per the NCA Bylaws, the Legislative Assembly meeting is governed by parliamentary procedure, and the following pages provide some relevant information in that regard.

There is always some standard introductory business that is addressed by the LA at the start of the meeting. It is standard to talk about the association's finances as well as NCA's operating budget for the upcoming calendar year. Each year members are invited to submit resolutions to the Resolutions Committee for ultimate consideration by the LA. If resolutions are submitted by the relevant deadline, they are put on the agenda for discussion by the LA at the annual meeting.

Process and format for submitting proposals

The Executive Committee asks each council/committee to review proposals and provide feedback prior to each EC meeting. The chair has the option to circulate a proposal to other council/committee members for comment. Chairs are also able to respond with comments, questions, and recommendations. Please note, a council/committee is not obligated to comment on each proposal.

All proposals to the EC and LA should include:

- Summary
- Strategic Priorities
- Financial Implications
- Recommendation
- Main Motion
- Exhibits

Alternates (Proxies)

NCA's Bylaws are silent on proxies but does specify how a replacement can be established.

According to Article III, Section V(D), "Vacancies among the representatives of Interest Groups, the four regional associations, the National States Advisory Council and the Association of Communication Administration Executive Committee may be filled in the same manner as the original representative was appointed".

For example, if a group's bylaws stipulate that the Chair is also the group's LA representative, and the chair cannot fulfill their LA member responsibilities or attend the annual LA meeting, the chair must resign their position as chair and the newly elected chair may participate in the LA meeting. In short, a vacancy in the position must exist for an alternate person to represent the group; that person must be elected in the same manner as originally prescribed by the group's bylaws.

The Basics of Parliamentary Procedure

NCA Legislative Assembly abides by Robert's Rules of Order. Parliamentary procedure is simple in principle. It is based largely on common sense and courtesy. It just seems technical due to the special vocabulary used. If the vocabulary is understood, the rules are easy:

Basic Principles of Parliamentary Procedure

Only one subject may claim the attention of the assembly at one time.

Each proposition presented for consideration is entitled to full and free debate.

Every member has rights that are equal to every other member.

The will of the majority must be carried out, and the rights of the minority must be preserved.

The personality and desires of each member should be merged into the organizational unit.

Motions

The proper way for an individual to propose that the group take a certain action is by making a motion.

Main Motions have for their object the bringing of questions, or propositions before the assembly for consideration. Only one main motion can be considered at a given time by the assembly.

Subsidiary Motions have for their object the modification or disposition of the main motion being considered. It is in order to propose them while a main motion is still before the assembly, and to vote upon them before voting upon the main motion.

Privileged Motions have no connection whatsoever with the main motion before the assembly but are motions of such importance that they are entitled to immediate consideration. The main business before the house may be temporarily set aside to address a privileged motion.

Incidental Motions arise "incidentally" out of the business of the assembly and have very common characteristics.

Process for Handling a Motion

- A member rises and addresses the presiding officer.
- The member is recognized by the presiding officer. When a member has been recognized, the member is the only member entitled to present or discuss a motion.
- The member proposes a motion. The motion should begin "I move that" followed by a statement of proposal. It is not permissible to discuss the merits of the motion either prior to or immediately following the formal proposal of the motion.
- Another member seconds the motion. The member simply states, "I second the motion." If nobody seconds the
 motion, the presiding officer may ask "Is there a second to the motion?" If there is none, the Presiding Officer
 may declare "The motion is lost for want of a second."
- The presiding officer states the motion to the assembly. When a motion has been properly proposed and seconded, the officer repeats the motion to the assembly. It may then be spoken of as a "question", a

- The assembly discusses or debates the motion. To speak, a member must obtain the floor in the same manner as when presenting a motion
 - The presiding officer should show preference to the proposer of the motion.
 - o A member who has not spoken has prior claim over one who has already spoken.
 - o The presiding officer should alternate between proponents and opponents of the motion.

[&]quot;proposition", or a "measure."

 The presiding officer should recognize a member who seldom speaks in preference to one who frequently speaks.

Discussion must be Confined to the Question that is "Before the Assembly"

The presiding officer takes the vote on the motion. Before taking the vote, the chairman ask, "Is there further discussion?" or "Are you ready for the question?" The chairman proceeds to take the vote by announcing "All in favor of the motion (STATE THE MOTION) raise your voting card and say 'aye'. The chairman then says "Those opposed raise your voting card and say 'No'."

The presiding officer announces the results of the vote. The officer announces the vote by saying "The motion is carried; therefore (STATE THE INTENT OF THE MOTION)." or if the vote is in the negative, the officer states "The motion is lost." Another motion is then in order.

Amending a Motion

The purpose of the motion-to-amend is to modify a motion that has already been presented in such a manner that it will be more satisfactory to the members. The following are common methods of amending

- By addition or insertion to add something to the motion which it did not contain.
- By eliminating or striking out to subtract or eliminate something from the original motion.
- By substitution to eliminate something from the original motion and substitute something else in its place.

An Amendment may be Hostile, but it must be Germane

A hostile amendment is opposed to the spirit of the motion to which it is applied. To be germane, an amendment must have direct bearing on the subject of the motion to which it is applied. An amendment may nullify the original motion, but if it relates to the same subject matter, it is germane.

Types of Amendments:

- Amendment of the First Rank An amendment to the motion.
- Amendment of the Second Rank An amendment to an amendment, that modifies and relates directly to the amendment, and NOT to the original motion.

No Amendment Beyond the Second Rank is Possible

If it is desired to amend two separate and unrelated parts of a motion, then it must be done with two amendments of the first rank. Until an amendment of the second rank is voted on no other amendment of the second rank is in order. Until the amendment of the first rank is voted upon, no other amendment of the first rank can be proposed.

Order of Voting on Amendments

- Amendments are voted upon in inverse order of proposal.
- Discussion is held and the vote is taken upon the amendment to the amendment.
- Discussion is called for and the vote is taken upon the amendment to the motion.
- When the vote on the amendment has been taken, discussion on the motion as amended is opened and when completed, a vote is taken upon the motion as amended.

Items that are not on the published agenda may only be considered after all other agenda items have been taken up and following a two-thirds vote to consider. Prior to such vote, the maker of a substantive motion may have up to two minutes to explain (not debate) the proposed motion to the body.

- Only Legislative Assembly members shall offer motions and vote.
- Motions must be given to the Director of Membership and Governance, Justin Danowski, via the private chat function. This process is intended for substantive motions and amendments, and when requested by the presiding officer.
- Delegates must use the "raise hand" function when requesting to speak. The presiding chair will recognize only
 those utilizing the "raise hand" function. Delegates shall state their name and the constituency represented
 prior to starting to speak.
- No delegate may move the previous question (close debate) prior to an opportunity for one affirmative and one negative speech on a motion.
- During debate on a motion, affirmative and negative sides will alternate speaking turns.
- Delegates may speak for up to two minutes when recognized. Non-members of the LA may address the LA with the permission of the assembly.
- The presiding officer may invite the members and guests to informally consider a motion for a specified length of time. During such time, members will be recognized to speak and will be allowed additional opportunities at the discretion of the chair. When the set time expires, the chair may take a straw poll if no motion is offered for formal consideration.
- Each NCA member who offers a resolution shall have the right to explain their resolution to the Resolutions Committee. The Resolutions Committee may: (1) endorse, (2) oppose, or (3) offer no recommendation, regarding resolutions submitted to the committee.
- The Executive Committee (EC) at an EC meeting following a convention and before the next annual convention shall review and approve the minutes of LA meetings. Copies of minutes reviewed by the EC shall be distributed to LA members serving at the next meeting.

Summary:

Vinita Agarwal, Teaching and Learning Council Chair, drafted the proposed resolution in support of the Foundational Communication Course in June 2022. The draft resolution was crafted based on guidance from the Task Force on Strengthening the Basic Course report (chair, Cheri Simmonds, Illinois State University; 2013). The proposed resolution was reviewed by TLC members and feedback was incorporated. Based on TLC feedback, the draft was also circulated to the officers of the Basic Course Division for feedback and approval.

The Resolutions Committee reviewed the proposed resolution in August 2022 and provided suggested edits to the TLC. Edits were incorporated by the TLC and the Resolutions Committee chose to endorse and forward to the Legislative Assembly for final approval.

Whereas the National Communication Association is the largest scholarly association in the world dedicated to the study and teaching of Communication and is an integral community of thousands of Communication scholars, teachers, and practitioners.

Whereas the National Communication Association is committed to prioritizing and enhancing the foundational communication course in institutions of higher education.

Whereas the foundational communication course is central to upholding the principles and practices of effective human communication.

Whereas the foundational communication course signifies that communication is its own discipline with unique contributions to both higher education and to the world at large.

Whereas the foundational communication course has been central to the communication discipline from an instructional and disciplinary perspective and for supporting the health of graduate programs and disciplinary association membership interests.

Whereas the foundational communication course is central to the teaching of communication skills by faculty with a background in the discipline of Communication to a wide array of instructional constituencies.

Whereas the foundational communication course is central to the teaching of communication skills (such as monitoring and presenting yourself, practicing communication ethics, adapting to others, practicing effective listening, expressing messages, identifying and explaining fundamental communication processes, and creating and analyzing message strategies), by faculty with a background in the discipline of Communication to a wide array of instructional constituencies.

Whereas NCA supports and defends the inclusion of a communication course or courses in college and university core requirements including the multiplicity of approaches that it signifies and the instruction of that course or courses by faculty trained in the discipline of communication.

Whereas NCA maintains that student delivery of presentations in hybrid, online, or in-person formats without rigorous training and evaluation by Communication faculty does not constitute Communication competency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT THE NATIONAL COMMUNICATION ASSOCIATION affirms the fundamental value of foundational communication skills for all students, reaffirms the importance of its teaching by trained communication experts, and advocates for the inclusion of the foundational communication course in the university core curricula of institutions of higher education.



The National Office partners with the EC to Transform Lives through Communication by effectively serving our members and the Discipline with a culture and climate that is inclusive, diverse, equitable, accessible, and welcoming.

SELECTED ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN YEAR ONE AND YEAR TWO QUARTER ONE

- 2023–2027 Strategic Plan Adopted by Legislative Assembly (LA). Align staff and resources to maximize the success of the new plan. Guiding staff and governance groups in establishing annual goals and metrics aligned with the Strategic Plan.
- NCA IDEA Strategic Plan Endorsed by LA.
- Institutionalized orientations for NCA Leaders (LA, EC, Standing and Governance Committees, Divisions, LA). Designed Leaders Retreat to build community; feedback has been overwhelmingly positive.
- Continuing to build an evidence-informed culture and seeding collaboration opportunities at all levels. Soliciting and utilizing member feedback to inform programming and processes. Work underway on 2023 Membership Survey, Convention Survey, and staff training.
- Instituted legal review of NCA contracts to mitigate risk. Instituted vendor selection process based on three bids, one

- Initiated process to resolve charitable registration issues in consultation with legal counsel and auditors.
- Web redesign RFP refined for 2023 bids. Staff will review the proposals received.

HIGHLIGHTS (continued)

- Invested in making National Office a welcoming space for members and staff. Refreshed the National Office and hosted three NCA receptions since August 2022. Plans are underway to host Communication Department chairs from Washington, D.C., Maryland, and Virginia universities in the second quarter, possibly when the USC School of Communication Director is visiting.
- Hosted a successful 2022 convention in New Orleans. More than 4,200 attended and more than 5,000 unique names appeared in the program in 1,000 sessions.
- NCA awarded nearly \$205,000 in grants that supported member projects and programs throughout 2022.
- Based on the positive feedback received from an NCA grantee, who was invited to present at the 2022 SSCA, we decided
 to feature at least one NCA grantee as part of NCA programs at the Regional Conferences. All current program staff will
 attend at least one regional meeting to better understand the regional meetings and build relationships with our affiliate
 partners, and at the same time, with our NCA leaders and members in attendance.
- Leadership Development Committee received a record number of governance and award committee nominations.



- Job descriptions created and 2022 annual performance evaluations were conducted. 2023 Annual Performance Goals
 finalized through a collaborative process. The first quarterly reviews are set for the week of April 3rd.
- Employee Handbook revised, approved, and distributed. Employee onboarding is refined in consultation with new hires and HR consultant.
- Engaged team in planning 2023 staff retreat. Scheduled for March 21 and 22.
- Investing in Professional Development.
 - Senior Team completed two-day Management Training Program in 2023 first quarter.
 - Junior staff professional development is also provided with professional development funds.
 - In April, the entire team participated in first of a series of workshops to build an evidence-informed culture in the National Office.

As approved by this council, I will serve as the IDEA Council Chair as a temporary replacement between January 1 – July 1, 2023, for Cerise L. Glenn while she is on leave.

Report of IDEA Council Activities

- 1. Report of our business meeting at NCA in 2022
 - A. We welcomed the new acting representative Liahnna Stanley from Indigenous Caucus.
 - B. We were informed of Executive Council approval of the Cerise Glenn's leave and clarified the remaining steps needed for Jim Cherney to stand as Temporary IDEA Council Chair.
 - C. Roseann Mandziuk reported on the status of the IDEA Strategic Plan and we discussed the IDEA Council's role going forward with implementation.
 - D. We discussed the status of the two proposed amendments and decided to revisit those in February when we had more information about what the IDEA Strategic Plan might mean for the council's role.
 - E. Shari Miles-Cohen explained the plan for hiring the new diversity officer.
 - F. Members reported that some caucuses were concerned about making changes to their bylaws regarding qualifications for the representatives, but since Jim Cherney (DIC) and Deryl Johnson (LGBTQ Concerns) were both running for re-election and anticipated winning, we decided to revisit this question in February.
 - G. Discussed presentation of award to Rachel Griffin, who would be at the convention on Saturday. We planned to give it at the Intercaucus Reception. [Note: we later learned she would leave before the reception, so Jim presented it to her at her last panel that day.]
- 2. Report of the IDEA Council meeting at the February 2023 Leadership Retreat
 - A. We welcomed Lisa Calvente, the representative from the new Caribbean Communication Caucus.
 - B. We reviewed our award calls and discussed their success, and determined that we did not wish to make any changes at this time.

- C. We revisited the question of crafting guidelines for the election of caucus representatives, and determined that several of the caucuses have made changes to their bylaws along the lines proposed earlier. We decided that we would continue to encourage other caucuses to do so but to avoid dictating what they should do with their bylaws.
- D. We decided to table the amendments to the NCA Bylaws until we had a clearer idea of the mandate for the incoming diversity officer.
- E. We discussed next steps in implementing proposed actions under the IDEA Strategic Plan. The current priorities are to coordinate with the new Diversity Officer once hired and to gather data on diversity and access in future surveys of NCA members.
- F. We planned for NCA 2023
 - a. We plan to create panels on three topics: Freedom to Live (emphasizing topics of oppression such as police brutality), Freedom to Teach (focusing on controversial curricula such as CRT, Sexuality, and Gender Studies), and Freedom to Lead (a panel led by the new caucuses that might focus on global indigeneity).
 - b. We discussed concerns with the 2022 Intercaucus Reception and plan to evaluate and contribute to arrangements for the 2023 reception.

- I. Between NCA in November 2022 and February 2023, council members spent time actively recruiting members for the two open editorships—CCCS and TPQ. The PC chair had numerous virtual and phone meetings with potential applicants.

- V. Other council tasks included generally overseeing the work NCA's publishing program, attending meetings, and communicating with editors/T&F/DC office staff, reviewing Aims & Scopes submitted by new editors-elect, reviewing special issues etc.

Chair's Report to the April 2023 Legislative Assembly

At the February leadership retreat discussions focused on: (a) the need for advocacy at the K-12 level to promote Communication's value, (b) to support inclusive pedagogy in ways that address systemic challenges to IDEA values, (c) to create resources for graduate program directors, (d) translate TLC's efforts in structural ways through publication or alternative media dissemination for audiences within and outside of the higher education setting, (e) support NCA's doctoral program database development for prospective students searching the website, and (f) review upcoming NCA Foundational Course Resolution.

Following the February leadership retreat, the TLC has met twice for its monthly meetings (March and April). The following updates summarize our work and discussions since the leadership retreat:

- 1. Initiated discussions with NCA Executive Director, President, and First Vice President (FVP) regarding the best mechanism for K-12 advocacy and to further actionable progress on NCA's stand and position at the state and K-12 levels. The best course of action was to set up a workgroup (versus Presidential or FVP task force). Dr. Shari Miles-Cohen, ED, is looking into the process for initiating a K-12 workgroup to focus on this issue and will be getting back to the TLC on next steps.
- 2. TLC-sponsored three panels are under development for submission to NCA by the May deadline:
 - a. Panel on Professional Identity and Development, by Katherine Thweatt
 - b. Panel on Inclusive Pedagogy, by Jon Hess (lead), Qingwen Dong, and Andrea Vickery
 - c. Panel on critical thinking and advocacy in K-12 educational contexts, by David Yastremski (lead), Sandy Pensoneau-Conway, and Qingwen Dong
- 3. Create resources for graduate program directors:
 - a. Short course for NCA developed by Qingwen Dong (lead, chair), Sandy Pensoneau-Conway (co-chair), Jon Hess (co-chair), and presenter: Katherine Thweatt.
 - b. Short course titled "Strategies and Tactics for Cultivating Graduate Teaching Assistants (TAs) in Communication Program" invites "seven directors or coordinators from outstanding graduate TA programs to share their ideas and introduce their guidelines and principles in training their own TA's" (from short course rationale).
- 4. Discussions with editors of Communication Education and Communication Teacher for translating TLC foci into potential submissions and/or alternative avenues for dissemination:

- a. Guest visit by Dr. Kyle Ruddick at the March TLC meeting explored editor vision and ways of exploring collaboration in the TLC's efforts for the year with the editorial focus. Currently we are looking at submissions or potential communication artifacts being developed for 2024.
- b. The inclusive pedagogy panel (Jon Hess, leading) will be working closely with Kyle to see how shared concerns of the TLC and Communication Education may be articulated through the panel development and engagement at NCA convention. The goal is to see if such synergies can translate to productive dissemination of the foci of the panel and Communication Education (e.g., through forum submission, essay submission, or podcasts) that can be useful to educators from the K-12 through higher education settings and outside the discipline.
- c. Future years can further explore different avenues in which such a partnership can be truly collaborative and beneficial for the different audiences the TLC would like to reach and Communication advocacy in general.
- d. Guest visit by Dr. Brandi Lawless, editor of Communication Teacher, scheduled for May TLC meeting. Dane, Hannah, Vinita, and Brandi will have a preliminary meeting before the May TLC meeting.
- 5. Doctoral Program Database development for revised NCA website (Hannah, Dane, Katherine, Andrea, and Vinita):
 - a. Hannah highlighted the redundancy and unviability (and controversial nature) of the reputation-based criteria on which the current doctoral program database is based. Based on the page visit rankings, it was clear that (a) it was a well-visited page (hence the need); and, (b) visitors were not presumably finding what they were hoping to on the page (owing to short session duration before they navigated away from the page).
 - b. The goal is that the revised program database should reflect current ethical and relevant concerns of graduate program student seekers and display them in a manner that is accessible and useful in providing an accurate and comprehensive picture that can productively motivate next steps.
 - c. Discussion has been initiated with resources and ideas shared electronically for what categories the revised NCA doctoral program database on the website should display for potential graduate program students searching NCA's website for graduate programs.
 - d. An in-person meeting over Zoom is under process of being scheduled before the May TLC meeting.
- 6. NCA Foundational Course Resolution (Vinita-lead, Sandy, basic course expert, Jon-basic course expert)
 - a. The NCA Foundational Course Resolution was drafted by the TLC revised and approved with feedback from the EC before being submitted to the Resolution Committee (RC) for feedback. Upon making revisions, the Resolution is up for LA review and approval.
 - b. LA April 2023 virtual meeting presentation of the Resolution by RC. Participate in discussion as needed.
