Arnold Distinguished Lecture](#) will be delivered by renowned scholar Dr. Thomas K. Nakayama, whose presentation is titled "The Challenge of Global Whiteness." The [NCA Presidential Address and Awards Presentation](#) will provide an opportunity to honor this year's winners following NCA President Dr. Kent A. Ono's Presidential Address, titled "Civic Activism and Social Justice: Leading NCA As/Through Change." Many additional events and special activities are scheduled for you to enjoy as well.

I am very excited about this year's convention and hope that you have an enjoyable experience, one that renews you, one that inspires you, one that transforms you, and ultimately one that highlights the benefits of gathering together and considering Communication at the Crossroads.

Communication at the Crossroads Series

The Communication at the Crossroads Series at this year's convention features special sessions focused on key issues within the discipline, focusing especially on where we have been and where we might be heading.

[Communication at the Crossroads Series: Administrators Discuss the Discipline and Its Future](#) (Thursday, November 19, 2:00 PM Eastern)

This session brings administrators together to share how the Communication discipline is generally understood and viewed by their counterparts. Those in attendance will develop a greater understanding of how administrators at their own institutions might view their departments and an awareness of what they might do to secure and advance their departments in the coming years.

This session will mark one of the first occasions when research pertaining to what instructors and students have experienced during the pandemic is presented. Those in attendance will be able to take part in this initial exploration and discussion and will be able to incorporate what is presented to inform and guide their own classrooms and home institutions.

National Communication Association Past President James W. Chesebro was dedicated to making the discipline of Communication more diverse and inclusive. His passing earlier this year provides us with an opportunity to reflect on his tremendous influence. Those in attendance will be given the opportunity to reminisce about one of the discipline's true giants, discuss his legacy, and explore how we might continue and expand upon his vision for the discipline moving forward.

In this session, current and former presidents and executive directors of communication associations will discuss issues and challenges related to convention planning and decision making.
