Some of the things listed: black lives matter, driving while black/brown, #metoo, white supremacy, fascism, anti-war, asylum seekers—the list goes on and on. These are the types of things Nina is interested in programming next year, from an intersectional approach.

7 - Program Planner's Report (Bernadette Calafell, Vice-Chair)

Total of 85 papers submitted, 51 accepted, 60% acceptance rate

Total of 40 panels submitted, 25 accepted, 62.5% acceptance rate

Asked for an extra slot, which we got.

Myra W. and Bernadette worked together to have two panels programmed in partnership with the Asian and Pacific American division

Transferred 4 papers to scholar-to-scholar

Took two slots to create two special, timely panels in reaction to #CommunicationSoWhite

1. Rhetoric so white
2. Communication so white

Also circulated a petition in the summer about the overwhelmingly whiteness of the publication editors and distinguished scholars. Felt it was important to have honest conversations about the challenges faced by marginalized people in this division in particular. There was a very robust discussion at the Rhetoric so white panel. The room was filled, and it was an emotional time. There was talk about where to go in the future. The second panel focused on communication theory in general. It was another very instructive panel, where we took away initiatives that we're hoping to put forward with the publications counsel as well as NCA. How do we mentor and recruit diverse journal editors, how do we teach people to write review. Reach out to Bonnie Dow, Kent Ono, or Ron Jackson if you're interested.
